





No, both sexes are quite capable of breaking through the 'cemented-up' opening. When the young are ready to fledge the female starts breaking through from the inside with the male sometimes helping from the outside. Just check the beak shape in Zonda's superb pic - I suspect sheet metal wouldn't be enough to contain a bird in its hole!

It's believe that reducing the diameter of the nest cavity is just an anti-predator mechanism. Tree snakes, brood parasites, rodents and avain predators are doubtless commonly encountered threats across much of the nuthatch families' range. One American species goes so far as to daub sticky tree resin around the entrance hole and another sweeps around the hole with noxious, foul smelling insects. Yum...

I was interested to see the photo of your colour-ringed Pied Wagtail and forwarded the photo to the bird ringer. He has sent me the following information about the bird:

BTO ring; X899992

Age at ringing; first year (3) Date of ringing; 15th October 2009 Place of ringing; Abbotsbury Swannery

Wing length; 89mm Weight; 22.6g

The bird has, therefore, survived two winters. The maximum age recorded for a Pied Wagtail is 11 years and 3 months but most live just two years. Your bird is obviously feeding well in your garden and must have a good chance of surviving longer than the average age!

Here on the Isle of Wight, we have had records of Tufted Ducks that were colour-ringed at Radipole, of a Greylag Goose ringed in Norway and subsequently seen in the Netherlands and Spain, and of an Avocet ringed in SW France, but presumably this wagtail hasn't travelled that far. Would you mind telling me the name of the town/village where you live and giving me the first date you saw the wagtail in your garden so that I can pass the information on? Alternatively, perhaps you could contact the ringer directly at steve_hales@btinternet.com?

Well, assuming you really did take this pic at Portland, and it's not from an Indian trip or some such.... 🤨 – the rump rules out Red-throated. Head pattern rules out Rock, Water, Olive-backed, the mantle rules out Pechora, Buff-bellied and Tawny, bill is all wrong for Richard's and Blyth's. Which leaves the bothersome pair - Meadow and Tree Pipit. Tree Pipit tends to have larger, paler supercillium and darker eye-stripe, clean lores and less contrasty tertials (inners not as well demarcated from edges). Meadow tends to show more diffuse super, often being just a tapering 'raised' brow above eye, plus a clear contrast between dark inners to tertials and clean outer edges.

The length of the hindclaw and calls are completely diagnostic (but not so helpful here, eh?)

On balance I'd be happy to call your bird as Meadow Pipit. They're pretty common at Portland, which is on their return migration route anyway. Most Tree Pipits there just go straight over in springtime, plus they've yet to have their first one go through yet.

Now tell me it's a Long-billed Pipit from the Middle East, Iol.

EDIT – hope that didn't come across as cocky as my girlfriend says it does, lol. (She just ain't as great a birder as I am 🙂)

DOUBLE EDIT - Zonda, that Long-tailed Tit image is SUPERB! No baloney!!



Hiya Zonda,

I used to be part of a small (we felt 'select' was a good word 😉) group of chaps with nets, often on nature reserves too. We were netting for micromoths which are generally either too small or too darn quick to identify confidently without popping them into a pot first. Most were shown around for the others to check before being released at the point of capture - usually within a minute or so of being netted...although some (worn/critical specimens) were kept for later examination.

All of this is perfectly legal, even on SSSIs/LNRs, as long as the site owners are aware, have given permission and the species list is later provided. Although wandering across MoD land when the flags are flying is not to be advised!

So my point was that people with nets may well be aiding the fate of a site, friendly and informed, keen to share and not to be worried about.

Although you do always get those clueless tw@ts who are just out to grab themselves a butterfly / dragonfly just to add to a non-labelled (and therefore scientifically pointless) collection because it's summertime and the birds are 'quiet' at this time of year.

Alternatively, just get tanked-up before you go out and challenge away!!
