Upon my return I came across three fairly lethargic male Orange Tips, which were warm enough to fly, but to cool to patrol and thus making frequent stops to bask.

Being probably the last person on UKB to obtain an open wing OT shot, I made up for it today in style!

Another highlight was in the form of two huge, pristine Large Whites, and both settled with wings open. Holly Blues were everywhere, as were Speckled Woods, and these are becoming a pain by seeing off any passing Butterfly and sending up the one lined up in the view finder!

A final treat for the day was the discovery of a female Orange Tip resting on a spent Daffodil head in my garden.

When it went down I walked over to it's approximate position, and utopia!, a fresh Green Hairstreak perched on a Bluebell, an ideal colour combination. Everything was perfect for a visit to find some Pearl Bordered Fritillaries. I arrived on site just before 8 am, and immediately saw Pearl fly up in front of me. They were quite lively even at that hour, but made frequent stops to bask. The Pearl hunt was interrupted several times by a couple of Green Hairstreaks, which insisted on posing in a photogenic manner on Bluebells. Hard to resist, and very welcome.

Among the dozen or so Pearls seen was my first female of the season, found warming up on a Bluebell. When she later flew onto the ground several males approached her but she was not receptive and each one quickly took the hint. ( already mated perhaps ).

Gary Norman paid a visit and bought with him a bank of cloud, which spelt the end of proceedings. He did however earn 10 points for spotting a Pearl resting in a tree, awaiting the return of the sun, which was not going to happen any time soon.

All images (except the Pearl in the tree) were taken between 8 and 9 am.



It would be another 80 miles before I caught this brighter sky up !. As I was near Storrington by now, the improved weather was ideal for a Duke of Burgundy hunt.

When I arrived on site Dave Cook, Rolf Farrel and Gary Philpot had beat me to it, and had located a resting Dingy Skipper. I was told of the earlier sunshine, which had produced a few Dukes, but the cloud had now caught up. We did, however, have one or two cloud breaks and the Dukes responded, with three spotted in the air together. I also saw a Dingy/Duke dispute. Photography was fairly easy as the conditions made the Dukes rather lethargic.















## ARCTIC PEARLS

Although the air was freezing this morning, the sun was very strong. With these conditions in mind I thought that if I could find a sheltered, sunny spot I might be in luck.
I had such a spot in mind so I headed for Abbots Wood. When I arrived it seemed that I may have

pushed my luck too far. Nothing at all flying, and it was chillier than I had hoped for.

After about 30 mins. a solitary pearl appeared, which raised my hopes somewhat, and better still this Pearl rose up to another flying Pearl.

Over a period of about an hour about ten Pearls were seen, and as things turned out the morning was not a lot quieter than normal. Unsurprisingly no other species were seen.

I was keen to find out how the Pearl Bordered Fritillaries had coped with the weather. On arrival at Abbots Wood the conditions were similar to Tuesday, a clear sky, and the sun warming up the same sheltered spot visited on Tuesday. But, over a two hour period only three Pearls were seen, and these were flying quite normally, until the building cloud finally obliterated the sun. Just before I left the site a Pearl which had been basking on the ground, flew up into the shelter of a bush, allowing another underside shot.

The Adonis Blue almost escaped my attention last year, indeed I only managed to photograph one specimen in the whole of 2016.

So this morning, after the rush hour had eased, I headed off to Mill Hill in West Sussex.

On arrival it was cloudy with the promise of some distant blue sky, which in the event remained distant.

Once I had located a few Adonis it became clear that the weather conditions favoured the photographer, the Butterflies were still lively, with many giving me the slip, but others were content with basking.

On the precarious descent to the bottom of this very steep hill, I found the first of two mating pairs, the second pair were on the wing with the male towing his wife !. Right at the base of the hill the Adonis were found in large numbers, the vast majority being male, but several lovely females were also found among the flora.

Without doubt this was the best session I've ever had with this species.

WEDNESDAY 24th MAY.

Starting out on my journey to Wiltshire, I had enjoyed full sunshine until just after Petersfield when a thick, early morning mist descended completely blocking out the sun. On arrival at the Marsh Fritillary site, the mist had lifted into low cloud, with little sun. However I spotted my first Marsh Fritillary immediately on arrival, but it would be a full 30 mins before a second was seen. Baring in mind I had only seen one over four days in a previous visit, I began to think they were in for a bad year.

Worries were dispelled when the sun suddenly burned through the low cloud, and as if by the flick of a switch Butterflies erupted from the grass and shrubbery in all directions, there were Marshies everywhere! I soon realised that any photography would have to be accomplished quickly as the Butterflies responded to the increasing heat and more and more chases were taking place, and basking Butterflies were few and far between. By 10.30 I had a camera full of images, and enough of the heat.

So I moved on to Tilshead, more of which in the next report.

On May 11th, I reported visiting a strip of military land near the Wiltshire village of Tilshead, which looked very promising. I paid a further visit after my morning with the Marsh Fritillary. By the time of my visit, it was mid morning and very hot, no good for photography, but there were Butterflies everywhere, mainly Adonis, Common and Small Blues, with some Brown Argus, plus Dingy and Grizzled Skippers.

As my Daughter is busy running a pub I offered to take the children to school during my stay, but this posed a problem in getting over to Tilshead early enough on what was forecast to  $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right\} =$ be a very hot day. So the solution was a very early start, the next day, in order to pick up the Kiddies at 8.45. I arrived on site just before 7am, to find hundreds of Adonis and Common Blues warming up, mainly face down on Grass stems, they were everywhere.

The visit also produced several Grizzled and Dingy Skippers and my first UK Forester Moth.

I don't think this site is on any Butterfliers radar, but holds huge potential for 'Blue' species.

For the first time I went over to Tide Mills for a summer visit, to see what migrants might have made it over from the Continent. Usually this location is a good bet in the Autumn, with regular sightings of late Clouded Yellows, and if one is lucky a Long tailed Blue or two.

 $Today\ this\ site\ produced\ about\ six,\ fresh\ Small\ Tortoiseshells\ and\ a\ similar\ number\ of\ Painted\ Ladies,$ some very worn. A large clump of Red Valerian proved to be a magnet for Butterflies and included a brief visit from a fresh Large White. I also had a quick glimpse of a male Wall Brown.

As well as Butterflies the extensive shingle is home to many coastal plants. I have posted an image of the fairly scarce Yellow Horned Poppy, which is at home next to the sea.













That takes me back to childhood holidays, Trevor – shingle, shells and horned poppies (and the smell of oil of eucalyptus to get the inevitable tar off my hands and clothes!). That valerian really is a butterfly magnet – nice photos.



Never the less it was a fantastic sight, and I felt compelled to nip home and grab my camera.





Doug. had taken a cracking image of a Purple Hairstreak, resting closed wing, low down on a leaf of a coppiced Sweet Chestnut. Unfortunately his offer to show me where it was failed when we discovered just how much coppiced Chestnut there was to search. My first opportunity of a PH photo had slipped away.

BUT! about 10 mins. later he spotted another PH further along the path on another coppiced Chestnut leaf. This time I was lucky and obtained a passable closed wing shot, then she suddenly opened up, I could hardly believe my eyes a beautiful female PH showing her purple to perfection.

A little later, as I was watching some Bramble blossom, another PH flew past me and landed just long enough for two bad shots. Altogether between us we found five PH low down.

obscured by leaves.
The second PH was much more straight forward ,as it flew onto a leaf above my head.
The resulting shots were only possible using maximum zoom.



The SCARCE COPPER. 8th July 2017.

On the first day of our visit to the French Pyrenees we stopped by an ancient stone bridge with a very fast flowing stream running beneath. My attention was soon drawn to a very bright, small Butterfly on the other side of the road.

Closer inspection revealed that there was a small colony of very fresh, bright orange, Scarce Coppers,

busy nectaring on Astrantia, a form of which can be found in English gardens.

Indeed in other locations where Astrantia was growing, Scarce Coppers wouldn't be far away. Anyone seeing the male Scarce Copper for the first time could be forgiven for not realising it was a member of the Copper family (unless the underside was seen). But the female has all the characteristics of the Copper family.

It would be true to say that the male does for orange what the Adonis does for blue, with a sheen of yellowy bronze, whereas the Adonis can deliver an 'electric blue' sheen.

I hope you enjoy the images of this stunning little Butterfly. Trevor.

Checking the Sussex BC sightings page last night, it looks as though we may be in for another extended season. Clouded Yellows are being reported in increasing numbers, and a female Long Tailed Blue was photographed in a Hassocks garden, on a Pea plant.

A very fresh Painted Lady proved very difficult to get near, being very flighty, but a little stealth won the day in the end. Among the ageing Common Blues was one fresh specimen all the others were looking very tired, as was the surprise of the morning, a very tatty male Silver Washed Fritillary. It was in such a state that even it's flight was slow and lethargic.

and for a short while we had two down together. Both Butterflies were worn unfortunately, but none the less it was good to see them.

It was also a pleasure to find a BH for a Guy from Norfolk, who had never seen one before.

After a while I spotted faded, but intact Small Copper nectaring on Ragwort. When I took a step back and turned around, there, hardly visible, was a second brood Small Pearl Bordered Fritillary, again nectaring on Ragwort.

The visitors book in the hut suggested that about four or maybe five SPBF had been seen in recent days.

What is very important about this second brood ( and hopefully for next year ) is the fact that these Butterflies were bred and born naturally on site.

I would like to dedicate today's SPBF images to those people who made today's sighting possible.

After a few of shots I too left them alone.

Later on, after failing to find a lone female, I went through the gate towards the steps,

and found a fresh female nectaring. Unfortunately she was not in a good position for a shot, and my attempt to get closer sent her up, I saw her fly over into the meadow. In the few seconds it took me to return to the meadow, a male had found her and they had paired up, a second mating pair in less than two hours!. This pair took several flights before finding a suitable bramble on which to complete their act. Interestingly when both mating pairs took flight, it was the female that took the lead, and the male was towed through the air with wings closed.

In all in excess of twenty males and four females were seen this morning.

The warm, sunny weather meant that most were supercharged, making the Wall Brown seem quite placid.

Other species seen were quite a few Common Blues, fresh and faded, a fresh Brown Argus, and three new Red Admirals.



Two of these kept together for many minutes and landed several times a few inches apart. I thought a pairing might take place, but this was not to be.

I was now very optimistic of a great day, three Cloudies on arrival. In the three hours or so of my visit about eight Cloudies were seen, including one fresh specimen.

Despite a thorough search not a single Common Blue was found, indeed the only other species present, with three seen, was the Red Admiral .


